Mr. Carey reported that DTC has an 86 percent success rate.

DNREC/ Dave Schepens, Program Manager of the Groundwater Discharge Section of **Proposed** DNREC, was in attendance at the invitation of the Council to discuss Changes proposed regulations governing the design, installation, and operation of onsite wastewater treatment and disposal systems. Also present was James to Onsite Cassidy, Manager of the Georgetown Office in charge of individual systems in Wastewater Mr. Schepens stated that the proposed changes are needed Sussex County. and to improve water quality as every stream in Delaware is impaired, there is a Treatment **Disposal** decrease in fish populations and an increase in algae blooms and dead zones, **Systems** and many waterways are not safe for swimming.

Mr. Schepens provided a background on the proposed regulations. The process was started in November 2008. Since that time, the Department has conducted 11 public workshops throughout the State, held several meetings with stakeholders, and established seven working committees. A Public Hearing was held on May 3rd. Another public hearing will be held on November 15th; once that hearing has been held, the Department plans to have the record open for a minimum of 15 days.

Mr. Schepens discussed the portion of the proposed regulations that relate to individual septic systems: (1) FEMA guidelines must be adhered to in "V" zones; systems, including holding tanks, will be located and designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, (2) all new and replacement on-site wastewater treatment and disposal systems permitted within 1,000 feet of the Chesapeake Bay Tidal Waters must meet performance standards.

Mr. Schepens reviewed the costs for individual septic systems: \$2,500 to \$5,000 plus the cost of having a service provider look at the systems twice a year – the service costs are approximately \$175.00 to \$250.00. Owners may retrofit one of these units on a permitted existing system as a repair which will usually add years to the drain field (for replacement systems only). The regulations allow for a homeowner to become a service provider for their own system.

Mr. Schepens reviewed a map outlining parcels in Delaware completely within 1,000 feet of the Chesapeake Bay Tidal Areas.

Mr. Schepens stated that, per the proposed regulations, cesspools and seepage pits will be prohibited statewide and when found must be replaced within one year. Cesspools and seepage pits will be found through inspections on the system for real estate transfers, complaints from the public for overflowing systems, and requests for authorization to use existing systems for additions of bedrooms and new dwellings on existing properties for which a septic permit

Mr. Schepens provided information on the Septic Rehabilitation Loan Program and the Septic Extended Funding Option.

At the conclusion of the presentation, Mr. Phillips stated that property owners to be affected by the 1,000 feet overlay should receive notification of the November 15th Public Hearing.

Military The Proposed Ordinance sets the fees the Clerk of the Peace charges for marriage and civil union ceremonies for Delaware residents, non-residents, and active United States military personnel.

George Parish, Clerk of the Peace, explained the Proposed Ordinance and he stated that it would extend the County's appreciation and gratitude to the men and women of the military as it would provide for the same rates that are charged to Delaware residents:

- \$50.00 fee for a marriage or civil union license
- \$50.00 fee for conducting a marriage or civil union ceremony in the office of the Clerk of the Peace or on The Circle or any building fronting The Circle
- \$75.00 fee for conducting a marriage or civil union ceremony outside of the office of the Clerk of the Peace
- \$50.00 fee for performing a renewal of marriage or civil union vows in the office of the Clerk of the Peace or on The Circle or any building fronting The Circle
- \$75.00 fee for performing a renewal of marriage or civil union vows ceremony outside of the office of the Clerk of the Peace

Mr. Parish noted that New Castle County and Kent County have already implemented this reduction of fees.

Mr. Phillips noted that, at the time the Council introduced the Proposed Ordinance, some Council members expressed an interest in <u>waiving</u> the fees for men and women of the military. For this reason, prior to public comments, Mr. Phillips made the following Motion: M 530 12A Motion was made by Mr. Phillips to waive the fees (related to marriage and

Report (continued)	During Sandy, the County provided information through its press releases and network of social media including Twitter and Facebook. We also developed a new service to our citizens in the form of video reports which provided critical, real-time updates to those seeking information. <u>The results were astounding</u> . During the storm:			
	 The County's website had over 57,000 views; Facebook followers jumped nearly 200 percent; Reach through the Facebook page (followers to friends and friends of friends) grew to 44,203; The EOC Twitter handle had the most referrals and activity in its history; and The YouTube Video Reports had over 32,000 views.
