Report	1. <u>National Incident Based Reporting System Numbers for Sussex</u> <u>County</u>		
	The Delaware State Police provided the following information which was reported by the FBI and their Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The FBI tracks crime within the County, as recorded by the three DSP troops located here. The crimes are broken down into two groups – violent crimes and property crimes. Violent crimes saw a reduction over 2011 by eight percent, while property crimes saw an increase of two percent. Overall crime for the County for the Year 2011 was down by one percent.		
Private Activity Volume Cap Reassign- ment	Mrs. Webb reported that correspondence has been received from the Department of Finance, State of Delaware, requesting that any portion of the 2011 Private Activity Bond Volume Cap Allocation in the amount of \$27,780,000 assigned to Sussex County, which will not be allocated either to a qualified project or identified as eligible for carry-forward, be reassigned to the State for reallocation to the Delaware Economic Development Authority. This request is made annually to allow the State to maximize usage of its Private Activity Bond Volume Cap.		

Mrs. Webb reported that, during 2011, the County did not have any projects apply for the Volume Cap funding.

Presentation of Compre- hensive	Mrs. Webb presented the Sussex County Comprehensive Annual Financia Report for Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011.

Fiscal Year Ended 6/30/11	Mrs. Webb announced that the County has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting (CAFR) annually for nine years, from Fiscal Year 2002 – Fiscal Year 2010. She noted that this program recognizes state and local governments that prepare and issue an annual comprehensive financial report of the highest quality.		
	Mrs. Webb reported that the Independent Auditor's Report states th "The financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all mater respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, t business-type activities, and each major fund of Sussex County, Delaware of June 30, 2011,"		
	Mrs. Webb reported that in December, the Council knew the County's surplus amount (\$3.4 million) and decided on additional expenditures at that time: special grant request funding, tax credit, and contributions to the two pension funds.		
	Mrs. Webb reported on the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance as of June 30, 2011 for the Governmental Fund (General Fund and Capital Projects Fund). Revenues were \$46 million with Realty Transfer Taxes making up \$14.3 of that amount; an increase of 1.2 million over last year. Mrs. Webb noted that there were not a lot of changes in revenues this year compared to last year. Expenditures were \$42 million, resulting in a Net Change in Fund Balances (Surplus) of \$3.4 million, adding to the Beginning Fund Balance of \$73.8 million, resulting in an Ending Fund Balance of \$77.3 million. In Capital Projects, Revenues were \$985,276 and Expenditures were \$980,239; most of the activity was airport related improvements and expansion.		

Mrs. Webb reviewed the Balance Sheet of Governmental Funds; the total Fund Balance as of June 30, 2011 was \$77 million. Mrs. Webb reported that the new Fund Balance Policy was approved in June 2011, as required by GASB, whereby definitions were put on all the classifications that were in Fund Balances, i.e. Nonspendable, Restricted, Committed, Assigned, and Unassigned.

Presentation Mrs. Webb reviewed General Fund Revenues and Expenditures and she of Comprenoted that the County's Revenues over Expenditures is beginning to increase. She explained that this is not because of real estate related hensive revenues and the economy, it is because the County has done so well Annual managing expenses. She stated that revenues have not grown as Financial dramatically as appears on the graph in her report; it is the expenses that Report have been reduced to match revenues, i.e. personnel costs (45 less employees for due to retirements, which affects health benefits and pensions). She noted Fiscal Year that the surplus is coming from the reduction in expenditures – a savings of Ended \$3.3 million.

) Mrs. Webb reviewed the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual (General Fund as of June 30, 2011). Realty Transfer Tax taken in was \$14.3 million; \$1.6 over budget.

Mrs. Webb reported that Capital Projects from July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011 were:

- Expansion and improvement of the Industrial Airpark
- Angola Neck, Johnson's Corner, and the Oak Orchard expansion areas were in the construction phase
- Construction is in process on a major treatment plant expansion project at the Inland Bays Regional Wastewater Facility

Mrs. Webb presented sewer highlights:

- Unified fund implemented
- Loss before capital contributions and transfers was \$38,000 (\$2 million in connection fees 43 percent decrease)
- \$1.6 million sewer infrastructure paid by developers

Mrs. Webb reported that as of June 30, 2011, the Pension Trust Fund (Pension Fund and OPEB Fund) had a value of \$74 million.

Mrs. Webb reported on long-term debt. There is \$191 million in outstanding bonds payable including \$19 million in sewer revenue bonds and \$172 million in general obligation bonds. This debt is only for sewer districts; there is no General Fund bonded debt. Mrs. Webb reported that the County has received two positive bond ratings; recently, Standard & Poor's rating services raised its rating on Sussex County, Delaware's General Obligation Bonds to AA+ from AA, the highest AA rating. Mrs. Webb reported on the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards: \$47 million was spent by the County in Fiscal Year 2011, all due mostly to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Fund (\$26 million). Federal Awards also include grants from Rural Development, State Revolving Fund, and Department of Energy.

Chip Guy, Communications Director, introduced Bryan Johnson who will join the County as an intern for the spring semester; Bryan is a Delaware Tech communications major.

Additional Mr. Cole referenced the listing of the top 200 delinquent property owners Business (taxes); he noted that a lot of those on the listing are LLCs and he questioned if the County can require the disclosure of the names of the individuals that make up LLCs and corporations. Mr. Moore stated that the County would have to go after the record property owner as opposed to who owns the LLC. Mr. Phillips also inquired whether or not the County can require full disclosure of an entity making an application or filing for a permit. Mr. Moore stated that he would have to research the matter.

Mr. Cole also questioned if the County is being effective in taking care of delinquencies and Mr. Moore stated that yes, the County is effective.

Mrs. Deaver stated that she wanted to make it clear that she has not introduced any legislation that would require people to get a permit to demolish buildings. She also stated that there are potentially two very old, illegal dumps in her district and she noted that DNREC is pursuing this and she is monitoring the situation.
