1. **State Electric Energy Bids**

As per the attached information, we are pleased to announce that Sussex County will save approximately 17.87 percent in our electric supply charges as a result of the rebid of electric supply for our contract that expires June 30, 2010. This will result in approximately \$248,000 in annual savings to Sussex County government in our various electric bills, especially for our wastewater treatment plants, pump stations, and larger facilities. Sussex County is a partner with the State of Delaware and Kent County in purchasing electric. We believe that this provides additional savings through a greater bulk purchase.

3. **Delaware State Police Report – February 2010**

> As per the attached, during February the Delaware State Police handled 3,229 complaints in Sussex County. They made 1,930 traffic arrests, 337 felony criminal arrests, and 505 misdemeanor criminal arrests during the month.

4. <u>County Employee Biweekly Pay Cycle</u>

As previously approved by the County Council, biweekly pay for all County employees will be implemented on April 16. This will result in a savings for the Sussex County Council and administrative staff time in processing two fewer payrolls each year. The estimated savings per year is \$12,000. County paramedics are currently paid on this same cycle. Non-paramedic County employees will start this cycle with a paycheck on April 16 that includes payment for two extra days, since this pay period includes 11 working days and one paid holiday. The next payroll on April 30 will be a regular biweekly pay based on a two-week cycle. Employees should contact the Personnel or Accounting departments with any questions they may have.

InvestmentMrs. Webb presented a proposed change to the County's Investment Policy
concerning collateral modifications. Mrs. Webb explained that the County
holds collateral for all of its cash accounts that are over and above what the
Collateral
Modifi-
margin of 120 percent and it is being recommended to reduce this margin to
102 percent for the following reasons:

- All large municipalities, such as the State of Delaware, New Castle County, Kent County and the City of Dover also require 102 percent collateral.
- It will increase the competitiveness of the Certificates of Deposit bidding process as the banks will not have to buy as much collateral, yet the security of the principal will still be maintained. This reduction may encourage some of the smaller banks in the area to bid.
- The County's financial advisors, Public Advisory Consultants, recommend this change.

PepperGina Jennings, Director of Accounting, and Brandy Bennett, Housing
Coordinator, reported on the property that the County owns on Park
Avenue/ (the Pepper property). At the March 30th Council meeting, Ms
Bennett advised the Council that, if they are interested in pursuing the
acceptance of a bid on this property, a separate RFP would have to be
issued to seek bids from the public for the private use of the home.

Ms. Jennings reported that, during the last RFP process, no interest was expressed in this property due to the improvements needed and due to the fact that the house would only be available for approximately three years. In addition, Ms. Jennings stated that the FAA requires fair and reasonable rent since it is an airport property. For these reasons, Ms. Jennings recommended that this house be placed out to bid to be purchased and removed from the property within the next year. This recommendation would save the County the cost of demolishing the home in three years.

It was noted that the County should maintain the right to refuse all bids.

Mr. Wilson clarified that the previous RFP resulted in a bid for two of the houses (one of which was the Park Avenue property) and that the bid for the Park Avenue property was approximately \$1,200.

Randy Mitchell, Principal of Nentego Properties, LLC was present with Dennis Schrader, Attorney with Wilson, Halbrook & Bayard, P.A.; Scott Aja, Professional Engineer with McCrone, Inc.; and D. J. Hughes, Professional Engineer with Davis, Bowen & Friedel, Inc. They stated that this rezoning application includes two sites, 15.73 acres along Route 24 and 3.68 acres behind the existing C-1 commercial zoning; that the site is currently used for agriculture and, if the application is approved, will be used for general retail, restaurant, and bank-type uses, except for the service road which was requested by DelDOT; that they propose to take the 3.68 acre parcel, make an interconnecting road to other commercially approved sites adjacent to Route 24 and rezone it to CR-1, resulting in the Nentego MR-RPC being reduced from 373 dwelling units to 299 dwelling units; that this will require the Applicant to come back to the Planning and Zoning Commission for site plan review (for both the MR-RPC and the CR-1 District); that density will remain the same; that the developers feel that the reduction of the RPC and expansion of the commercial zoning will better serve the area; that interconnectivity will be provided between this project, the existing C-1 commercial zoning, and the adjoining Riverside Plaza for both pedestrian and vehicular traffic; that there are no delineated wetlands on the site; that the application meets all setback requirements; that they propose landscaped buffers from 30 feet on the side to 50 feet on the rear of the property; that a 60 foot setback is proposed along the front, which is after the right-of-way is widened 15 feet and in addition to a 15 foot multi-purpose path; that interconnections will allow residents of the Oak Orchard area to access the properties without traveling out onto Route 24 since there will be a connection to Oak Orchard Road; that the uses will be limited to those permitted in the B-1 Neighborhood Business District and the CR-1 Commercial Residential District; that the proposed commercial project will be served with central water by Tidewater Utilities; that the site will be connected to the expansion of the Oak Orchard Sanitary Sewer District; that a Traffic Impact Study was completed and the Applicant has agreed with DelDOT to make contributions to offsite improvements; that a portion of the area for the rezoning will provide internal service roads between various commercial activities; that all activities between the various commercial activities at Indian Mission Road to the farthest point of this project will be serviced by an interior service road; that they received no negative comments from PLUS; and that the conditions of the original RPC will remain in effect.
