Administrator's Report

Mr. Baker read the following information in his Administrator's Report:

1. County Government Day – April 29, 2009

County Government Day for Girls and Boys State will be held April 29, 2009, in the County Council Chambers beginning at 9:15 a.m. As in the past, a mock County Council session will be held with students picked as Council members. Student representatives from throughout the County participate.

2. National Association of Counties Newsletter – George Cole

Vice President George Cole was profiled in the National Association of Counties newsletter dated April 20, 2009. Mr. Cole serves as the Delaware representative on the National Association of Counties Board of Directors. Attached is a copy of his profile information.

3. Woodlands of Millsboro Proposed Sewer District Public Hearing

On April 30 at 6:00 p.m. at the Millsboro VFW, the County Engineering Department will be holding a public hearing regarding the proposed Woodlands of Millsboro Sewer District. A subsequent referendum will be held. The referendum is scheduled on June 25, 2009.

4. Swine Flu Update

The State of Delaware Department of Health and Social Services is the lead agency in terms of appropriate response for the State of Delaware. The Sussex County Emergency Operations Department and Paramedic Department are monitoring activities closely. Dispatching responses have been amended to request information regarding recent travel for 9-1-1 callers who exhibit flu-like symptoms. County staff is participating in conference calls related to this matter.

Quarterly Financial Report

Mrs. Webb presented the Quarterly Financial Report for the nine months ending March 31, 2009 and the estimated actual for Fiscal Year ending 2009.

Quarterly Financial Report (continued)

General Fund Revenue and Expense Report - Revenues

Realty Transfer Tax revenues are down 21.33 percent. Real estate related categories are down including Services for Building and Construction, which is down 27.70%. Constitutional Offices are up 12.33% primarily due to the Sheriff's Office being up 121.49% because of foreclosures. Interest earnings are down 13.14%.

Total Revenues are off approximately \$2 Million.

General Fund Revenue and Expense Report – Expenditures

Expenses in total (actual) are still under budget 5.83%. Excess of revenues over expenditures is \$143,612.12.

Estimate Revenues and Expense for June 30, 2009 - Revenues

Year-to-date actual is \$38,854.201.00. Estimated for April 1, 2009 to June 30, 2009 is \$6,643,243.00. Estimated actual total for June 30, 2009 is \$45,497,444.00.

Revenues are based on actual estimations and not budget.

Estimated Revenues and Expense for June 30, 2009 – Expenditures

Year-to-date actual is \$143,613.00. Estimated for April 1, 2009 to June 30, 2009 is a deficit of \$3,896,228.00. Estimated actual total for June 30, 2009 is a deficit of \$3,752,615.00.

Expenses are based on an actual estimate.

Mr. Baker and Mrs. Webb stated that, in January 2009, a \$7.7 million estimated deficit was reported. Based on this estimate, the County incorporated budget cuts including: filling positions from within/transferring employees, voluntary employee furloughs, voluntary employee group hospital opt out, cell phone line reductions, electric savings, less vehicles taken home, reduction on overtime pay, recovery of interest on loans to sewer construction projects, legal fee reductions, salary and benefit costs, etc.

Early Mr. Baker presented a proposal for Early Retirement Options for the

Retirement Options

Council's consideration, as follows:

Option #1

Early Retirement Options (continued) This Option would be offered only to employees who have a vested right to participate in the County's pension plan as of July 1, 2009 (the "Effective Date"). Employees also must be at least 62 years of age with at least eight (8) years of credited service, as of the Effective Date. As an incentive, eligible employees who elect this option would be awarded credit for five (5) years of additional service for the purpose of pension calculation, thus increasing the monthly pension benefits they would receive. Department Heads are excluded from this option.

Option #2

This Option would be made available only to employees who are age 62 or above as of the Effective Date and who were hired after July 1, 2001. As an incentive, eligible employees who elect this option would be awarded up to two (2) additional years of credited service, thereby enabling the employee to reach the eight-year minimum service required to become vested in the County's pension plan earlier than otherwise possible. In determining the length of service for the purposes of this Option, to be eligible, an employee must have at lease six (6) years of service as of September 1, 2009. Pension calculations would be based on 8 years credited service. Department Heads are excluded from this Option.

Option #3

The many changes in the economic landscape have impacted two of the County's Departments more than others, in particular. As a result of the current market conditions, the Assessment Department and the Building Code Department have experienced substantial changes in the demand for their services. Consequently, ERO may be appropriate for a larger proportion of the employees in these departments. To accommodate this potential need, Option #1 would be extended to all employees in the Assessment and Building Code Departments who are otherwise vested and eligible as of the Effective Date, but without regard to age. As with Option #1, eligible employees who elect this Option would be awarded credit for five (5) years of additional service for the purpose of pension calculation, thus increasing the monthly pension benefits they would receive. Department Heads are excluded from this option.

Mr. Baker explained that there is a cost for contributing additional amounts into the Pension Plan for Early Retirement Options.

Mr. Baker stated that they are recommending all three options. The estimated savings of offering all three options would be approximately \$200,000 the first year, which would include the cost of a one-time contribution to the Pension Fund to cover the additional pensioner costs.

Thereafter, an annual savings of approximately \$1 million annually is expected. The savings would be generated by (1) not replacing some of the retiring employees, (2) replacing the retiring employees with existing staff, and (3) replacing the retiring employees at lower salary levels. Mr. Baker noted that the savings amounts are based on estimates of eligible employees who may accept the offer.

Mr. Baker noted that, with the Council's approval, the three options would be offered to employees for 45 days, until June 15, 2009.

Cedar Creek Landing Proposed Streetlighting District Patricia Deptula, Assistant Director of Public Works, asked for the Council's authorization to circulate a Petition for the Cedar Creek Landing Streetlighting District. This subdivision is located on County Road 207 (Johnson Road) and Delaware Route One, northeast of Lincoln. There are 114 tax parcels in the subdivision and 111 improved parcels. This subdivision currently has 45 existing streetlights. The Cedar Creek Landing Homeowners Association is requesting that the Engineering Department provide petition forms to initiate the process to form the District. Ms. Deptula stated that Cedar Creek Landing meets the definition of a suburban community.

Ms. Deptula noted that she previously distributed, for the Council's review, copies of Sussex County Code, Chapter 95, Streetlighting, and Administrative Procedures. Ms. Deptula also distributed a listing of Sussex County's existing Streetlighting Districts, which total 16 (sixteen).

Dagsboro-Frankford SSD/ Custis Expansion Dagsboro-Frankford SSD/ Custis Expansion John Ashman, Director of Utility Planning, presented a proposal to authorize the Engineering Department to prepare and post notices for the expansion of the Dagsboro – Frankford Sanitary Sewer District to include one parcel of .50± acre (the Custis Expansion).

Mr. Ashman stated that this is a hardship case where the existing home burnt and a newer mobile home was placed on the lot. The exiting sewer system was failing and DNREC will not allow the new residence to connect to it. The owners of the parcel will be responsible for system connection charges of \$5,828.00 based on rates from July 1, 2008 until June 30, 2009. The owners have been working with Utility Billing for assistance and with Utility Permits on preparing for a connection.

George Parish, Clerk of the Peace, advised that the purpose of this proposal to increase fees is so that the taxpayers of Sussex County do not have to subsidize the operations of the Office of the Clerk of the Peace. Public comments were heard.

Dan Kramer of Greenwood spoke in opposition to raising taxes and stated that the effective date, as proposed by Mr. Parish, is not written in the Proposed Ordinance, and therefore, cannot be changed.

Mr. Parish withdrew his request to change the effective date of the Proposed Ordinance.

Lit Dryden of Georgetown spoke in opposition to the Proposed Ordinance. He stated that it is without merit and unnecessary; that the proposal is for a 40 percent increase; and that no phase-in, grandfathering, tiers or scaling is recommended. Mr. Dryden asked the Council to defer action on the Proposed Ordinance for further investigation and consideration.
