Presen-<br/>tation of<br/>PoppiesCindy and Dick Phillips were present on behalf of the Oak Orchard -<br/>Riverdale American Legion Post 28 Auxiliary. Mrs. Phillips provided a<br/>short history of the poppy. After World War I, poppies bloomed in the<br/>fields where American soldiers had fallen and the poppy became a symbol<br/>of remembrance. In 1920, the American Legion adopted the poppy as a<br/>symbol of remembrance and the following year, the Auxiliary adopted it as<br/>a memorial symbol. When you wear a poppy, you are saying that you<br/>remember our veterans that have died and that you are honoring our living<br/>veterans. Mrs. Phillips presented poppies to the Council asking them to<br/>wear the poppies with pride.

Mr. Cole presented a check in the amount of \$100.00 to Mrs. Phillips for the Oak Orchard – Riverdale American Legion Post 28 Auxiliary for poppies. Mrs. Phillips told the Council that the poppies are hand made by veterans and all money raised is used to help local veterans.

Barking Mr. Phillips advised that he had requested that "Barking Dog Complaints" be placed on the agenda. Mr. Phillips noted that on February 14, 2006 he asked for Council's approval to research the issue. He noted that, although it was not an enthusiastic endorsement by the Council, there were no comments in opposition. Mr. Phillips noted that, since the discussion at the Council meeting, a couple of local newspapers have printed that the Council is considering this issue and he has received calls and emails from people expressing their interest in the subject.

Mr. Phillips introduced James Smirk, who has done some research on this issue. He stated that there is a situation in his neighborhood, where a neighbor has two or three dogs that are outside sometimes at 5:00 a.m. and sometimes after midnight. He stated that the dogs sometimes bark for an hour continuously and that it is affecting his lifestyle and well-being. He stated that he would like for the Council to enact an ordinance to control

barking dogs. Mr. Smirk distributed copies of Kent County's Noise Ordinance.

Mr. Phillips stated that often, the Council has looked at the policies of other counties to help determine whether or not to move forward with an Mr. Phillips advised that Steve Watson, a Code Enforcement initiative. Officer for Kent County, stated that it is a difficult law but one that is often resolved by the people involved, once they realize there is a law and the law is understood.

**Complaints** Mr. Phillips advised that New Castle County also has a noise ordinance, which is enforced by the New Castle County Police. He also noted that Dewey Beach has an ordinance and there are townships in New Jersey and Pennsylvania that also have ordinances.

> Mr. Griffin questioned whether the Homeowners Associations deal with barking dog and noise issues through regulations or Restrictive Covenants.

> Mr. Smirk stated that when he questioned his Homeowner's Association, their response was that a notice would be posted asking for voluntary compliance. Mr. Griffin suggested that the Association should look into modifying their regulations to address the issue.

> Mr. Cole suggested that, if the Council pursues this issue, it should be addressed in a broader sense.

> Mr. Phillips stated that the dog barking problem is a widespread issue and that quite a few people were in attendance who wished to speak.

> Barbara Sullivan, President of Blackwater Village Homeowners Association, spoke in support of a dog control/noise ordinance. She stated that there are dogs in her subdivision that bark incessantly. She stated that their Homeowners' Association does have regulations on this issue in their Restrictive Covenants; however, it is very difficult to enforce them. She also stated that she believes people would comply with a County law more readily than a covenant.

> Mr. Dukes stated that he believes Homeowners Associations should regulate and enforce this issue.

> Mr. Phillips distributed an outline of a "Nuisance Dog Ordinance", which contained language about the standards that would be expected; it leaves open-ended, who would be the enforcement agency (possibly the sheriff, constable's office, or code enforcement officer); it stipulates that noise would have to be 30 continuous minutes; and it talks about certain fines.

> Major Randy Hughes, Delaware State Police (DSP), was present. He stated that the DSP does receive complaints about barking dogs, loud parties and music. He stated that, normally, they do not make arrests for barking dogs;

they refer the complaint to the SPCA and work with them on dogs at large. Also, in neighbor disputes, the DSP acts as mediator. He noted that if the County enacts an ordinance, the question would be who will enforce it and who will prosecute. He also noted that the conviction issue would be problematic.

It was the consensus of the Council to conclude public comments on this issue.

- Program Wendy Baker reported on the Land Trust's approval of a Motion to request the Council's authorization to utilize \$350,000 of already designated funds set aside for the Sussex County Land Trust for open space purchases. The Land Trust Board of Trustees recommended properties that are located within their targeted area, called the Sussex County Grand Wildlife Corridor Loop, linking already preserved lands by their partners and conservation groups - the State, the County, the Nature Conservancy, **Delaware Wildlands and various others.** She stated that they believe that Delaware Agricultural Lands Preservation Program is the best way to leverage their dollars to the maximum possible and the most cost effective way. She stated that the 500 acres at a cost of \$3 million represents a cost of \$6,000 per acre. Ms. Baker reported that the four properties identified are primarily in Western Sussex County. She stated that they are proposing to take the \$300,000 from designated County funds (as proposed by Mr. Stickels), \$350,000 from privately raised funds, and \$350,000 of County funds already designated for open space preservation – this would total \$1 million. Ms. Baker advised that as a part of the Program, the \$1 million would be matched by the State and the Federal governments for a total of \$3 million.

trator's Report

1. <u>Beneficial Acceptance</u>

The Engineering Department granted Beneficial Acceptance on April 18, 2006, to Henlopen Landing – Phase III, Agreement No. 517. The developer is Bridle Ridge Properties, L.L.C., and the project is located at the south intersection of County Road 275 and County Road 285 at Five Points in the West Rehoboth Expansion of the Dewey Beach Sanitary Sewer District, consisting of 54 single-family homes. Included with this report is a fact sheet on the project.

Energy Mr. Stickels announced that Steve Hudson. Director of Manage-Maintenance/Engineering, would be reporting on Energy Costs/Rates. He ment explained that the purpose of the report was to provide information on costs that would impact the Proposed Fiscal Year 2007 Budget. Mr. Stickels stated that Delmarva Power has announced a 59 percent increase for homeowners. He noted that they did not announce what the increase was for industrial users. In Fiscal 2006, energy costs at the Administrative Building on The Circle was \$73,000; that amount is expected to increase to \$158,656 in Fiscal 2007, a 117 percent increase. Energy costs at the South Coastal Regional Wastewater Treatment Facility was \$247,586 in Fiscal Year 2006; that amount is expected to increase to \$537,847 in Fiscal 2007. Energy costs at the Wolfe Neck Wastewater Treatment Facility was \$148,082 in Fiscal 2006; that amount is expected to increase to \$321,339 in **Fiscal 2007.** 

> Mr. Hudson reported that last year, the County consumed 11,000 Mega Watt Hours of power; 75 percent of that amount was attributed to water and sewer and 25 percent to Administration, libraries, Emergency

## **Operations Center, etc.**

Mr. Hudson reviewed the pros and cons of the County's options to try and reduce the anticipated increase in energy costs: join the State bid (aggregation partnership); solicit bids for electricity supply rates as a whole (third party); or solicit bids for electricity supply rates individually (third party).

Energy Mr. Hudson reported that the State has met with representatives from the Management The State, the three counties, and possibly a couple of municipalities will enter into a Memorandum of Agreement. A broker (Honeywell Corp.) will take the County's data along with the other groups and find the best energy rates at the time. A contract would then be entered into between the group and the energy provider.

> Mr. Hudson advised that currently, the County is at Step One – entering into an agreement with the State of Delaware. The Agreement is not an obligation to enter into a contract; it is an agreement to participate when the energy contract comes up for renewal. However, once the County agrees to participate in the contract with the energy provider, then the County would be obligated until the contract expires. The Memorandum of Agreement uses the assumption that purchasing in aggregate would save us money. Only usage fees would be brokered; transmission fees would still be regulated. The State would like to see all accounts at fixed rates. Seven out of thirteen original supplier requests have shown an interest in bidding; however, the State has narrowed the list down to four companies that are interested in bidding on a contract of this size.

> Mr. Hudson advised that the State has requested that the County approve and execute the Memorandum of Agreement by May 5th. Once it has been signed, the broker would find the best rates for the group. The County would then have the option to sign a contract with an energy supplier.

> Mr. Hudson recommended that the County create an Energy Management Team made up of individuals that understand the County's operations and current energy usage. The team would evaluate the County's current energy usage by looking at the buildings, new building designs, and electrical systems for the purpose of increasing efficiencies. Mr. Hudson reviewed several energy evaluation questions that would provide necessary information to the Energy Management Team.

> Mr. Hudson advised that the cost to join this program with the State is \$10,000; initially, they are recommending a one-year contract for the first term.

The primary objective of the HPG Program is the development of viable communities, including decent housing and a comfortable living environment, principally for persons of low and very low income. He explained that a new development has been proposed in the area (Old Mill Estates), which is to be located on the northern boundary of the landfill. Mr. Izzo noted the location of the boundary line of where the solid waste was actually deposited in the 1970s. He reported that in some areas, the solid waste is within 50 feet of the actually boundary of the landfill. Airport Consultant Contract Amendment	Mr. Hickin, Project Engineer, presented Amendment No. 19 to the Airport Consultant Contract with Delta Airport Consultants. A 35-foot crosswind runway was originally proposed at a cost of over \$7 million. The FAA was not supportive of that cost and asked that the project be scaled back. In response to the FAA's request, Delta Airport Consultants scaled the runway		

to get the cost down to an acceptable amount to the FAA. Mr. Hickin reported that the FAA has set aside \$550,000.00 for a 2006 grant; however, to apply for that grant, the project must be bid out. Mr. Hickin noted that the proposed Amendment provides for the bid process and the grant application, at a cost of \$64,996.00. Upon approval, Delta would repackage the design to what is acceptable to the FAA and bid the project.
