FiscalMr. Lawson, along with Susan Webb, Finance Director, Gina Jennings,
Director of Accounting, and Kathy Roth, Budget Director and Cost
Manager, presented the proposed \$121.1 million budget for Fiscal Year
2013 and the accompanying budget letter. Mr. Lawson stated that the
budget represents a collaborative effort between the Budget Committee and
Department Heads.

Mr. Lawson reported that the FY 2013 Budget again presents a challenge in that revenues remain flat and have increased at only a modest level for the General Fund. As compared to past years, revenues continue to see little to no increases which the Budget Committee believes represents the "new norm" for the County. Mr. Lawson stated that, thanks in part to the Council's leadership and fiscal responsibility along with conservative budgeting, the County will continue to operate without raising taxes or increasing fees even though revenues are stagnant.

- Review pension plan changes to begin January 2013
- Down 6.5 positions from last year's budget

The total budget in the amount of \$121,147.56 reflects a (14.04%) change compared to Fiscal 2012.

Mr. Lawson reported that the total operating budget increased .18% or \$84,000. As a result, there are no fee increases proposed. Taxable assessments increased 1.39%; intergovernmental grants decreased 14.02%; and overall revenues have leveled (a reflection of the economy and lethargic real estate market).

Mr. Lawson reviewed the County's primary funding sources: Realty Transfer Tax (28.4%); property taxes (27.1%); and charges for services – Constitutional Offices (17.6%). Mr. Lawson stated that the County is conservatively budgeting this year's Realty Transfer Tax lower than last year.

Mr. Lawson stated that, "in a time when municipalities across the country are filing for bankruptcy, public pension funds are drying up, and states are raising taxes to operate, including some neighboring states, Sussex County remains fiscally sound by only spending what we have. Sussex County is at a crossroads, and faces the difficult task of preserving the many attributes that make our county such a wonderful place to live while attempting to stimulate the local economy and spur job creation. At the same time the county must look to the future to prepare for growth and increased demand on County services". Mrs. Jennings reviewed the \$46 million in expenditures: Paramedic Program (27%); Grant-in-Aid (17%); Finance (9%); and Libraries (8%).

FiscalMrs. Jennings reviewed how one county tax dollar is spent: public safetyYear 2013(\$.58); Libraries (\$0.14); Housing Rehabilitation & Other CommunityBudgetSupport (\$0.08); Code Enforcement, Dog Control, Planning & Zoning,Presen-Permitting & Addressing (\$0.08); Special Services (includes EconomictationDevelopment, Airport, Engineering Administration, Public Works andSolid Waste); and General Government (\$0.05) (includes County Council,
Administration, Legal, Finance & Constitutional Offices).

Mrs. Jennings reported that the Proposed 2013 Budget reflects only a .18% increase in operating expenditures over the 2012 Budget.

Mrs. Roth highlighted the grant-in-aid program totaling \$7.4 million: 68% for public safety; 11% for wastewater; 7% for Agriculture and Land; 7% for Libraries; 6% for Community Grants, and 1% for Town grants.

Mrs. Roth reported that public safety grants total \$20.8 million: \$12.4 million for Paramedics; \$2.8 million for Emergency Preparedness; \$3.3 million for Fire and Ambulance Service; and \$2.3 million for Local Law Enforcement (includes increasing funding to \$25,000 for towns with local police and \$12,500 for towns without local police – back to the level it was in 2009).

Mrs. Roth explained that Community Development funding for Fiscal 2013 has decreased \$1 million compared to last year. This decrease is a result of reduced federal housing funding levels in both the Neighborhood Stabilization Program and the Community Development Grant Program.

Mrs. Webb reviewed the capital projects for both the General Fund:

- \$5.5 Million for Airport Projects Runway 4-22 Extension, Stormwater Improvements, Lighting and Pavement Improvements, and Guard Station
- \$2 Million for Public Safety Building Projects Emergency Services – Station 106; Emergency Communications Building; Emergency Operations Center - HVAC
- \$3.1 Million for Libraries Greenwood Library Expansion, Milton Library Improvements, South Coastal Library Improvements
- \$674,000 Building Improvements Administration Building, Records Management Building, and West Complex Building
- \$674,000 Other Projects Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Software, Property Acquisition, and Woodland Park Improvements

Mrs. Webb noted that the capital projects fund is its own separate budget as these funds are used for long term projects. Mrs. Webb also reviewed Enterprise (Sewer and Water) Capital Projects totaling \$21.2 Million; these projects are not in the sewer operating budget as they are new expansions and new districts.

FiscalMrs. Webb reported that the Proposed Budget shows a decrease of \$21Year 2013Million from the Fiscal 2012 Budget due to the stimulus projects that
occurred during the last three to five years.Presen-
tationMrs. Webb noted that the Budget Committee is recommending \$165 Million

Mrs. Webb noted that the Budget Committee is recommending \$165 Million in 5-Year Capital Improvements Funding.

Mrs. Webb explained that all the proposed rates for the sewer districts are included in the Budget and she highlighted the Enterprise Funds goals and objectives:

- Service Charges continue working toward a uniform sewer rate
- Decrease in assessment rates due to bond refinancing
- 3% increase in EDUs
- 3% increase in 2013 operating budget
- 56% decrease in capital projects
- System connection charges 2.7% increase for inflation
- Continue 100 foot cap
- Rate Study

Mrs. Webb reported that it is proposed that the sewer service charges increase by \$8.00 annually in most districts (Angola, Bayview Estates, Bethany, Ellendale, Holt's Landing, Johnson's Corner, Miller Creek, Oak Orchard, Sea Country, South Bethany, South Ocean View). The Dagsboro Frankford Sewer District is proposed to increase less than \$8.00 to become part of the unified sewer charge (uniform rate is \$262.00). The Long Neck Sewer District is proposed to increase \$15.00. There are no changes proposed for the following Districts: Blades, Dewey Sewer, Henlopen Acres, West Rehoboth, and Woodlands of Millsboro. It is proposed to increase the Dewey Water service charge by \$13.00 to cover the increase in the cost of water purchase from the City of Rehoboth.

Mrs. Webb reported that the budget and the accompanying budget presentation will be available on the County's website. Public Hearings on the budget will be held on June 19, 2012. The public can comment in person on that date, or submit comments through the County's website at budget@sussexcountyde.gov.

> **House Bill No. 325:** AN ACT TO AMEND TITLES 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 16, 23, 29 AND 30 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO SHERIFFS AND SHERIFF DEPUTIES

This Bill has passed the House and has been assigned to the Senate Executive Committee; a Hearing has been scheduled for June 6, 2012.

House Substitute No. 1 for House Bill No. 227: AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 9, TITLE 22 AND TITLE 31 RELATING TO HOUSING

This Bill passed the House on May 17th.

Senate Bill No. 195: AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 6 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO HOME CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT PROTECTION

This Bill has been released from Senate Committee.

Senate Bill No. 211: AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 11 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

Mr. Godwin reported that he presented the Council's concerns regarding this Bill, i.e. enforceability and cost that would be incurred by all three counties. This Bill was released from Committee.

Mr. Godwin noted that the General Assembly is on break for two weeks.

IndustrialJim Hickin, Director of Airport and Industrial Park Operations, presentedParka Lease Assignment (to assign the remainder of a 30 year lease) fromLeaseSuperior Lawn & Landscaping, LLC (Superior) to Laurel GardensAssignment/Holding, LLC (LGH). LGH is a landscaping business based in ChaddsSuperiorFord, Pennsylvania. They are buying certain assets of Superior, includingLawn &the operation in the County's Industrial Park; assignment of the leaseLandscapingcounty approval. LGH intends to continue operating the business

from the Industrial Park in the same manner as Superior. This is a ground lease for Lot 14 containing 3.92 acres in the Industrial Park. The 30-year lease began on October 1, 2003 and expires in 2033, with no option to extend; use of the property is limited to the current use – landscaping business operations. Rent is currently \$2,352 per year and increases by \$200 per acre (\$784) every five years. If approved, Superior will be responsible for preparing the assignment document, which will be approved by the County Attorney.

ResultsKaren Brewington, Director of Human Resources, reported that a
comprehensive review of the County's Life and Disability Insurance
benefits was recently completed through the RFP process. A summary was
prepared and provided by the Insurance Buyer's Council, Inc. The RFP
was sent to thirteen (13) carriers; through this comprehensive RFP process,
the County was able to meet the following objectives:

- Examine the competitiveness of current Life and Long Term Disability (LTD) benefits
- Obtain quotes based on new structure (ordinance) of disability benefits
- Identify a carrier to provide Life and Disability benefits including self-funded Short Term Disability (STD) Advice to Pay services
- Improve administration and claim management by selecting a carrier with the ability to actively manage integrated disability benefits
- Offer employees the opportunity to elect additional life insurance coverage on a voluntary basis at preferred group rate pricing and with relaxed underwriting

Mrs. Brewington reported that, through the RFP process, the County was able to obtain a significant reduction in group life and long term disability costs and to secure a multi-year rate guarantee (3-year).

Mrs. Brewington advised that, based on the review of the RFP responses, it

is recommended by Insurance Buyer's Council, Inc. to award the group life and disability coverage to Hartford.
