Jeff Niezgoda, Planning Supervisor for the Delaware Department of **DelDOT** Transportation, was in attendance to give a presentation on DelDOT's **Transpor-**Transportation Enhancement (TE) Program. The Transportation tation Enhancement Program, which is a Federal and State funded program, was **Enhance**established through federal legislation that is intended to encourage ment development of a more balanced, multi-modal approach to mobility and Program accessibility. The goal of the Transportation Enhancement Program is to provide funding needed to support the development and implementation of non-traditional, transportation related projects that highlight the cultural, aesthetic, and environmental goals of the communities in which they are built. All federal Transportation Enhancement projects must meet the following criteria: the project must have a relationship to surface transportation; the project must be dedicated to public use; and the project must fit into at least one of the twelve eligible activities. Examples of projects include: installing sidewalks, preserving scenic and historic areas, rehabilitating historic buildings, creating bicycle and multi-use pathways, renovating streetscapes, and installing lighting and crosswalks. Mr. Niezgoda stated that the program is for community-based projects. Project ideas may be submitted by municipalities, organizations, etc. by contacting DelDOT; if the project is eligible, DelDOT would help facilitate the project through technical and professional guidance.

> Mr. Niezgoda listed examples of active and completed TE Projects in Sussex County: Overfalls Lightship Preservation, South Bethany; York Street; Fenwick Island Median; Lewes Canalfront Park; Abbot's Pond Road Scenic Acquisition; Trap Pond Pedestrian Improvements; Dagsboro Sidewalk Improvements; Greenwood Sidewalk Improvements; Rehoboth Yacht Club Gateway; Laurel Train Station Exterior Rehab; Selbyville Train Station; Huling Cove Pedestrian Improvements; Mulberry Streetscape; Mispillion River Greenway; Georgetown Circle Renovations; and Georgetown, Layton Avenue. Projects for Fiscal Year 2008 include interior renovations to the Train Station in Laurel; Town of Delmar Streetscape Improvements (design phase); Mispillion River Greenway Phase 21 (construction); Town of Dagsboro Streetscape Improvements (design phase); and Town of Georgetown, Market Street, Streetscape Improvements (design phase).

Mr. Niezgoda stated that anyone seeking answers to questions regarding the program can access information on DelDOT's website.

Mr. Baker introduced Duane Coverdale, Tournament Director of the Bay **Bayball** Ball Classic Invitational. Mr. Coverdale reported that the national level Classic boy's basketball tournament will take place December 26th through Invitational December 30th at Cape Henlopen High School. Mr. Coverdale reported that this would be the third year of the tournament and that 24 teams from Grant 11 states would be participating. **Eight teams from Delaware will** participate, two of which are from Sussex County (Cape Henlopen and Woodbridge). Mr. Coverdale stated that grants have been awarded to every Delaware team that has participated (over the last two years). Mr. Baker reported that the County has budgeted a grant in the amount of \$15,000.00 for this event. He advised that the funding would be directed to a Scholarship Fund to be handled by the Delaware Community Foundation. The Foundation will monitor the expenditures and process the disbursements and report back to the County at a later date regarding the actual disbursements.

Investment Fiscal 2008, the County budgeted money for Peirce Park Group Investment Policy Management Consultants to develop the County's Investment Policy for the Pension Fund and to insure the ongoing health of the County's Pension and Post-Employment Benefit Fund. At the November 6, 2007 Pension Fund Committee meeting, Peirce Park Group presented the Investment Policy Statement to the Committee. Mrs. Webb distributed a copy of the Policy to the Council.

Mrs. Webb advised that, at the December 4, 2007 Pension Fund Committee meeting, Peirce Park Group presented the Investment Policy Report. Mrs. Webb commented on three highlights in the Report:

- Recommendation to continue to invest with the State of Delaware Pool. The Investment Pool offers a very wide range of investment choices with a low expense ratio and has had a good investment performance in the past.
- Recommendation to continue with the Wilmington Trust Company for the fixed income portion of the County's portfolio.
- Recommendation to find a new third investment manager or break up the investment ratios and find a fourth investment manager. (They do not feel that Fidelity Investments is the best fit for the County.)

FY 2008Mrs. Webb reviewed spreadsheets regarding the Pension Fund
performance as of September 30, 2007. As of September 30, 2007, the
Pension Fund had a balance of \$44.3 million and the Post-Retirement
Benefit Fund had a balance of \$10.8 million. Returns for the first nine
months of 2007, by investment manager were: Wilmington Trust - 8.32
percent; Fidelity Investments - 8.11 percent; and the State - 9.02 percent.
Mrs. Webb noted that the percentage increase in value as of September 30,
2007 was 8.73 percent.

Mrs. Webb stated that the proposed 2008 Pension Contribution is 10 percent, as per the Fiscal Year 2008 Budget and as per the actuarial recommendation. She stated that the Pension Fund is 93.3 percent funded (due to an increase in the number of employees, salaries and new actuarial tables, this amount is down from last year's amount which was 99.6 percent).

Mrs. Webb reviewed the Post-Retirement Benefit Fund. She advised that the County has been aggressively funding the Fund over the past few years due to changes in the GASB (Governmental Accounting Standards Board) Accounting Standards that require this un-funded liability be booked on the County's General Ledger by June 2009. Mrs. Webb reported that the current value of the Fund is \$10.8 million; the current unfunded liability is \$45 million.

Mrs. Webb advised that the Pension Committee recommends making the Fiscal Year 2008 budgeted contributions for the Pension Fund and the Post-Retirement Benefit Fund with the State of Delaware Local Government Retirement Investment Pool.

- 1. No materials shall be brought from off the site for processing, mixing or similar purposes.
- 2. The access driveway shall be stone or similar material to assist removing dirt from truck tires prior to leaving the site.
- 3. Any entrance improvements required by DelDOT shall be completed by the Applicant. All entrances shall be secured when the borrow pit is not in operation.
- 4. The hours of operation for the business on this site shall only occur between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. on Saturdays. There shall not be any borrow pit activity on Sundays.
- 5. No fuel shall be stored on-site for borrow pit operations.
- 6. No stumps, branches, debris, or similar items shall be buried on the site of the borrow pit.
- 7. The borrow pit shall have 3:1 slopes and the slopes shall be seeded and planted to control erosion. The pit shall not be greater than 28 feet deep at any point.
- 8. A Final Site Plan, including all pit slopes, excavation phasing, and reclamation plans shall be reviewed and approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission prior to the commencement of operations. Reclamation plans shall indicate finished grading, seeding and planting schedules designed to create a pleasing appearance.
- 9. The Applicant shall comply with all State and County erosion and sediment control regulations.
- 10. Markers and signs shall be placed at appropriate locations to designate pit areas.
- 11. The borrow pit shall be surrounded by a landscaped 50 foot wide unexcavated buffer strip and the pit shall be at least 100 feet from any street lines, 50 feet from all other property lines and 50 feet from all Federal wetlands. In addition, the borrow pit shall be at least 200 feet from any dwelling on property of other ownership.
- 12. No dredging activities shall be permitted on the site.
- 13. If the borrow pit excavation is not completed within five (5) years, the Office of Planning and Zoning may inspect the site and request written comments from all appropriate State agencies so that the Planning and Zoning Commission can review the comments and verify compliance with all regulations. All borrow pit activity and reclamation shall be completed within 10 years.
- 14. The Applicant shall also comply with all of the requirements set
