Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) Reporting Program

Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) Report – November 2024

1. <u>Reporting Year (RY) 2023 Reporting Summary</u>

Delaware facilities submit their EPCRA Section 312 reports (also known as Annual Tier II reports) using the *Tier II Manager* TM (T2M) database. For Reporting Year (RY) 2023, covering Jan. 1 – Dec. 31, 2024, over 98% facilities submitted 2,633 Tier II reports by the due date, March 1st. As of November 1st, the annual Tier II reports now increased to 2,716 for RY 2023. The program has received \$485,386.24 to date in annual fees. Currently 12,010 chemical entries have been reported for RY 2023, compared to 12,024 total chemical entries for RY 2022.

Tables 1-3 summarize key reporting metrics such as submitted annual Tier II reports, active facilities in the database, and other EPCRA facility updates since the last LEPC meeting. Chart 1 shows the trend of chemical entries submitted in annual reports throughout the past 5 years. A list of facilities missing their annual report is summarized in Table 4. The tables below contain Tier II reporting data according to a facility's LEPC designation. Facilities usually determine their own LEPC, but these determinations should be verified by each LEPC. LEPC's can access and view the reports through the T2M system.

3. Status of Missing Facility Reports

- 3 facilities from LEPC's May 2024 list have been resolved. The remaining <u>19</u> facilities listed below continue to need a determination by the LEPCs if the facilities are still in operation, and if so, acquire current contact information.

SERC Report

- The next Planning and Training Committee meeting is on November 21. The following meeting is on February 20.
- The next SERC meeting is on December 11. The following meeting is on March 12.
- An update to the SERT Plan will be reviewed at the November P&T Committee meeting. The update adds Public Warning Messaging Guidance which should aid in the issuance of public warning messages during incidents.

HMEP Report

- Currently in Year 3 of the HMEP three-year grant period. \$179,752.00 Total Grant Amount for Year 3. For Year 3 we have spent \$1,632.85.
- Year 2 of the HMEP Grant closed on September 30 with \$106,716.78 unspent. For Year 1, \$8,065.55 remains. A spending plan is being developed and will be discussed with the P&T Committee.
- The planning period for the next HMEP 3-year grant period (FY26-28) is nearing. Subgrantees are strongly urged to begin working on their grant projects. A project development guide will be shared at the November P&T Committee meeting. These projects will be uploaded into Smart Simple. User training will be occurring soon.
- Monitoring visits will be conducted with subgrantees between November and December.

DEMA Report

• DEMA and the Fire School deployed a 13-person Swift Water Rescue Team to Avery County, NC for water rescue operations in response to Hurricane Helene. DEMA deployed a staff member to South Carolina for EOC Support in response to Hurricane Helene. DEMA and the DNG deployed a 100-person general purpose company to Florida to conduct POD operations, cut and toss for route clearance, pumping, and other tasks in response to Hurricane Milton, turned back before operations could begin.

Glenn discussed SCEMS Annual Recertification process and the duties SCEMS performed during Return Day in Georgetown. He also discussed the interaction with the 31st CST.

DPH LEPC Report – November 2024

- Jillian Austin has been appointed as the Director of the Office of Preparedness effective October 7, 2024. Previously Jillian served as the Director of the Office of Infectious Disease Epidemiology.
- The 11th Annual Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Symposium was held on October 21 at the University of Delaware Audion. The symposium focused on DHSS & DPH roles and responsibilities within the Delaware Emergency Operations Plan (DEOP).
- DPH participated in an Evacuee Reception Center (ERC) training exercise on October 25 at the National Guard Stern Armory. The exercise involved the training and the setup of the ERC in the event of a radiological general emergency at the Salem or Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations.
- DPH assisted with the distribution of potassium iodide tablets to residents living within a 10-mile radius of the Salem/Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations on October 24.

- DPH staff will participate in the upcoming DEMA Radiological Emergency Plan drill on December 10.
- Extreme Heat Response Workshop is being planned for December 4, 2024.
