Mr. Vincent called the meeting to order.

Approval of Minutes

The Council considered the approval of the minutes of the April 16, 2013 meeting. Mrs. Deaver questioned why there was nothing in the minutes regarding comments made by Mr. Wilson regarding marriage equality and children. Mr. Moore stated that the purpose of minutes is to reflect official actions taken; that minutes are not a verbatim report of everything said; and that the meetings are recorded and the audio of the meetings are available, which is a verbatim report.

The minutes of April 16, 2013 were approved by consent.

Correspondence

Mr. Moore read the following correspondence:

DELAWARE SENIOR OLYMPICS BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

RE: Letter in appreciation of the Council's grant.

Rehoboth Beach Jazz Festival Presentation Dennis Santangini and Leon Galitzin, representatives from the Rehoboth Beach Jazz Festival, and Scott Thomas of Southern Delaware Tourism gave a presentation and an update on the upcoming jazz festival. They reported that, over the past 23 years, the festival has grown to become a premier "top ten event" in the United States, featuring world class Grammy winning performers; the event's growth has come from an expanded television promotional outreach to major metropolitan areas. Mr. Santangini and Mr. Galiltzin asked the Council for funding in the amount of \$10,000 to assist them with expanding the frequency and outreach of their television promotional commercials, thereby promoting Sussex County and the businesses/hotels that support the festival. They noted that the festival is very impactful in Rehoboth and the whole Cape region; that it helps put Sussex County on the map; and that it is a major event considered the "greatest jazz festival in the world".

The Council discussed and considered the request and it was noted that the funding request would be considered during the Fiscal Year 2014 Budget process.

Proclamation/ Conservation District The Council presented a Proclamation entitled "PROCLAIMING APRIL 28 THROUGH MAY 5, 2013 AS SOIL & WATER STEWARDSHIP WEEK" to David Baird, District Coordinator, and Debbie Absher, Director of Ag Programs, representing the Sussex Conservation District.

Public Hearing/ Amend MPHU Ordinance A Public Hearing was held on the Proposed Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 72, ARTICLE I, OF THE CODE OF SUSSEX COUNTY BY AMENDING THE DEFINITION AND APPLICATION OF "MODERATE INCOME" USED TO DETERMINE ELIGIBILITY FOR MODERATELY PRICED HOUSING UNITS".

Brandy Nauman, Fair Housing Compliance Officer, reported that HUD has asked the County to amend its Moderately Priced Housing Unit (MPHU) Ordinance to expand the income guidelines. Currently, the program is available to persons that are between 80 and 125 percent of the area median income. The proposed amendment, which was previously distributed to the Council, would expand the program to include persons that are between 50 and 125 percent of area median income. This proposed change is a requirement of both the HUD Voluntary Consent Agreement and the DOJ Consent Decree.

In regards to the Moderately Priced Housing Units Program, Mrs. Nauman stated that the County needs to make this a more marketable program; that when the program was first started, a density bonus and expedited review were great incentives; however, the County needs to look at it again.

Mr. Moore read a letter dated April 23, 2013 into the record from the Delaware Housing Coalition in support of the proposed lowering of the income threshold for the Moderately Priced Housing Program so that Sussex County households earning 50 percent of the area's median income (roughly

\$30,000 a year for a family of four) would be able to afford homes.

Public comments were heard.

Dan Kramer questioned if developers will be required to build a certain number of moderately priced housing units and he stated that developers should not be required to do so. He also stated that there is housing available for people who need affordable housing.

In response to questions, Mrs. Nauman stated that families that would be eligible for housing under this program would be able to purchase a home through several mortgage products, i.e. USDA Rural Development mortgage subsidy program.

Mrs. Nauman stated that the program is voluntary and a developer can select from three different income tiers; however, higher density bonuses are associated with the lower income bracket. It was noted that this program is a mechanism to provide affordable housing that allows people to live where they work.

There were no additional public comments and the Public Hearing was closed.

Public Hearing/ C/Z No. 1727 A Public Hearing was held on the Proposed Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE COMPREHENSIVE ZONING MAP OF SUSSEX COUNTY FROM AN AR-1 AGRICULTURAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT TO A CR-1 COMMERCIAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT FOR CERTAIN PARCELS OF LAND LYING AND BEING IN BROAD CREEK HUNDRED, SUSSEX COUNTY, INVOLVING TWO (2) PARCELS; CONTAINING 1.10 ACRE, MORE OR LESS" (Change of Zone No. 1727) filed on behalf of Louis D. The Planning and Zoning Commission held a Public Hearing on this application on March 21, 2013 at which time the Commission recommended that the application be approved.

Lawrence Lank, Director of Planning and Zoning, presented a summary of the Commission's Public Hearing.

The Council found that Louis O'Neal was present on behalf of his application. Mr. O'Neal stated that he has owned the property for 10 or more years; that he has an antique store on the existing C-1 commercial parcel and he is requesting approval to expand the size of the commercial space; that there are other commercial activities in close proximity; and that he would like to have the property zoned commercial to conform with the adjacent property.

There were no public comments and the Public Hearing was closed.

Old Business/ C/U No. 1950 Under Old Business, the Council considered Conditional Use No. 1950 filed on behalf of Erlin I. Rivera.

The Council found that the Planning and Zoning Commission held a Public Hearing on January 10, 2013 at which time action was deferred. On January 24, 2013, the Commission deferred action again. On February 14, 2013, the Commission recommended that the application be approved with the following conditions:

- A. There shall be no more than 10 trucks and/or trailers on the site at any one time.
- B. All trucks and trailers on the site must be operable and have valid registrations.
- C. No service, repairs or other types of maintenance shall occur on the site.
- D. The parking areas and spaces shall be clearly designated on the Final Site Plan. The parking areas shall also be clearly marked on the actual

- E. There shall be a 100 foot setback from the entire perimeter boundary of the Conditional Use. No parking of trucks or trailers shall be allowed in this setback area. The setback area shall be shown on the Final Site Plan and also clearly marked on the site with post and rail fencing or a similar barrier. If this setback area eliminates the Applicant's ability to reasonably park the trucks and trailers, the Applicant may apply for an expansion of the Conditional Use onto the remaining property owned by him. If such an application is required, but only in the event that it is necessary due to this setback requirement, it should be considered on an expedited basis without an additional application fee. Any such expansion shall only include the minimal area needed to comply with this setback requirement.
- F. Any security lighting shall be downward screened so that it does not shine on neighboring properties or roadways.
- G. The Final Site Plan shall be subject to the review and approval of the Sussex County Planning and Zoning Commission.

The County Council held a Public Hearing on this application on February 5, 2013 at which time action was deferred and the record was left open for two weeks for the Applicant to submit proposed conditions, after which the record remained open for an additional two weeks for responses and comments to the submitted proposed conditions. The Council deferred action again on April 16, 2013.

At the April 16th Council meeting, Mr. Lank distributed and reported on the proposed conditions received from the Applicant on February 13, 2013. There were no responses or comments submitted in reference to the submitted proposed conditions.

The proposed conditions submitted by the Applicant are as follows:

- 1. At no time will refrigeration units on any trailer stored on site be started, running or operating.
- 2. At no time will trucks be left to idle for an extended period and/or an unreasonable amount of time. Reasonable time will be considered that time needed to sensibly allow the trucks engine and operating systems to warm to allow the truck to be driven in a safe and reasonable manner. This shall include the time needed to hook and/or unhook from trailers.
- 3. At no time will any general maintenance be performed on any truck, trailer or vehicle except for emergency repairs needed for the safe and reasonable operation of said truck, trailer or vehicle.
- 4. At no time should radios, CB's or the like be at a volume so as to be heard from outside the truck or vehicle.
- 5. Entry and exit into trucks or personal vehicles shall be kept to a minimum, especially between the hours of 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m., so as to avoid the slamming of doors and trunks.
- 6. At no time shall trash, debris, tires or parts from trucks or trailers be

stored or left on site.

7. If personal automobiles are driven to or from the site, they shall be parked on the southerly side of the site.

Mr. Vincent referenced the Commission's proposed condition (E) relating to the setback of 100 feet from the entire perimeter boundary of the Conditional Use and he stated that he does not believe 10 tractor trailers would fit in the remaining area.

Legislative Update

Hal Godwin, Deputy County Administrator, presented the following legislative update:

House Bill No. 74 - "AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 31 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE".

Mr. Godwin handed out revised legislation which shows that the legislation was assigned to a different Committee. The legislation was assigned to the House Health & Human Development Committee. Mr. Godwin distributed information on the names and contact information of the Committee members.

The Bill has not yet been scheduled for a Committee hearing.

Mr. Godwin stated that Council members can review the Bill and make comments directly to the Committee members.

Legislative Update (continued)

Mrs. Deaver questioned how the State can prevail over the federal government's plan. Mr. Phillips asked Mr. Godwin to find an answer to this question.

In regards to this health insurance legislation, Mr. Vincent asked Gina Jennings, Finance Director Appointee, to (1) put together the County's information for submission to the Committee and (2) be prepared to testify.

House Bill No. 44 - "AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 25 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO PROPERTY".

This Bill was passed in the House.

<u>Un-numbered Senate Bill</u> – This Bill would allow Delaware residents 65 years of age and older to continue to qualify for the "Senior School Property Tax Credit Program" even if they are delinquent provided they have entered into a payment plan for taxes due.

This Bill has not yet been introduced. The County is currently compliant with this proposed Bill.

<u>Un-numbered Senate Bill</u> – This Bill provides for a property tax exemption for the dwellings of military veterans who are disabled and for their spouses, if the veteran is deceased.

This Bill has not yet been introduced and the County has been asked for comments.

Some of the Council members expressed hesitancy to support this Bill and suggested that the County should have its own ordinance to give this exemption to disabled veterans and their spouses.

Mr. Vincent directed the County Administrator to have an ordinance drafted to provide a property tax exemption for disabled veterans.

Animal Welfare Task Force Comments

Mr. Godwin referenced the draft report from the Animal Welfare Task Force, which was previously distributed to the Council; the deadline for comments was April 22nd and Mr. Godwin sent in comments: (1) a correction to the minutes regarding cat licensing and (2) a statement that Sussex County government wants the State of Delaware to take dog licensing and control back because it is an unfunded mandate.

Mr. Godwin noted that the final report will be released by the end of April.

House Bill No. 63 – "AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO AGRICULTURE".

Legislative Update (continued)

This Bill is the first leg of a constitutional amendment that forever guarantees the right of farmers to engage in modern farming and ranching practices.

This Bill is on the House Ready List.

Several Council members expressed confusion over what the Bill does.

Mr. Phillips asked Mr. Godwin to talk with Representative Atkins and ask him if there is a specific incident that is driving this legislation.

Administrator's Report

Mr. Lawson presented the following information in his Administrator's Report:

1. County Libraries Closing - Thursday, May 9, 2013

Please be advised, in two weeks, the County Libraries will close on Thursday, May 9, 2013 to allow staff to attend the annual Delaware Library - Maryland Library Association Conference in Ocean City, Maryland.

The conference provides library staff the opportunity to receive a multistate perspective and an expanded view of collaboration and partnering in addition to subject-specific learning.

County libraries will reopen at the regular time on Friday, May 10, 2013.

Delaware Solid Waste Authority (DSWA)/ Lease of Premises Michael Izzo, County Engineer, presented a Proposed Lease Agreement between the County and the Delaware Solid Waste Authority for the lease of premises of an existing solid waste transfer site (Long Neck Collection Station) at the Inland Bays Regional Wastewater Facility. This site has been operational since 1993 without incident; however, the Lease executed in 1993 did not contain any provisions for extending the lease. For this reason, a new Lease was created which is proposed to be in place for another 20 years with a provision for an additional 20 year extension.

M 201 13 Approve Lease Agreement/ DSWA A Motion was made by Mr. Cole, seconded by Mr. Phillips, based upon the recommendation of the Sussex County Engineering Department, that the Sussex County Council approves the Lease Agreement with the Delaware Solid Waste Authority to continue operation at the solid waste collection station at the site of the Inland Bays Regional Wastewater Facility.

Michael Izzo, County Engineer, presented the bid results for the Angola Beach Road Grinder Pump Station and Villages of Herring Creek Improvements, Angola Neck Sanitary Sewer District. Mr. Izzo explained that this is the final contract for the Angola Neck Sanitary Sewer District; there were 5 or 6 homes that could not be served via a conventional gravity system and a grinder pump system was set up to serve the homes. In addition, during the construction of the Angola Neck Sanitary Sewer District, the County took over a private sewer system and the system needs some upgrades. Mr. Izzo reported that there were four bidders on the project and that the low bidder was Harry Caswell, Inc. of Millsboro, Delaware, for the Base Bid amount of \$137,706.00. The Engineer's estimate for the project was \$173,460.00.

The Sussex County Economic Development Committee met on March 15, 2013 to hear two applicants for consideration of a Sussex County Economic Development Grant. Those applicants are Atlantis Industries Corporation and Grayling Industries (part of New ILC Dover, Inc.). On Tuesday, April 30, the Council will hear presentations from both applicants, and the Economic Development Committee will have recommendations for Council to consider.

Attached you will find the following:

- summary information letter regarding both applicants
- Economic Development Committee agenda
- minutes from the March 15, 2013 Committee meeting
- applications from both applicants

The recommendation from the Economic Development Committee will be to grant \$800 per job from the Economic Development Fund to both applicants as follows:

- Atlantis Industries 56 jobs, \$44,800
- Grayling Industries (ILC) 115 jobs, \$92,000

The \$800 per job is an amount that was approved by County Council on November 29, 2011, the time our Economic Development Incentives Program was passed. The County Economic Development Fund was created in 2004 and has been very successful.

The grant documents will contain specific language as to how the grants are paid out in relation to jobs added. We will also include claw back provisions if the job levels are not met. We will regularly review (anticipate every six months) the corporations' employment records to verify and account for the jobs tied to this grant.

Both applicants have partnered with the State of Delaware for use of the State's Strategic Fund Capital Expenditures Grant, as well as the match grant applied to capital expenditures. The State's press release for ILC is attached as is the email from DEDO concerning the State's participation with both applicants.

Within our incentive guidelines we may value each job at \$800.00, however keep in mind that the committee and/or Sussex County Council may make modifications to this, as per policy.

This meeting will be the first for addressing a grant request so keep in mind that a precedent may be set. We will have an opportunity to discuss both applicants and their grants after the presentations.

the Company designs and produces plastic containment systems. New ILC Dover, Inc. – based in Frederica, DE has acquired Grayling Industries, Inc. Grayling has facilities in Alpharetta, GA, El Paso, TX, and Juarez, Mexico. The Juarez operation will transfer to Seaford, DE over the next year. The Alpharetta warehouse operation will transfer to Seaford near the end of 2013. The El Paso warehouse will transfer to Seaford in 2014. The Company anticipates 115 full time jobs in one year, 125 full time jobs in two years, and 135 full time jobs three years and after.

The Agenda for today's meeting was posted on March 8, 2013 in the County's locked bulletin board (located in the lobby of the County's Administrative Office Building) as well on the Sussex County website.

Susan Webb, Finance Director called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone on behalf of the Economic Development Committee.

A Motion was made by Mr. Moore, second by Mrs. Webb to approve the agenda as posted. Motion Adopted by Voice Vote.

Mrs. Webb shared that there were two businesses present today that had made application for an Economic Development Grant, Atlantis Industries Corporation and ILC Dover/Grayling Industries.

Committee members were introduced and Mrs. Webb shared the Economic Development Grant Application review process.

During today's meeting, each Committee member was given the opportunity to ask questions. While individual questions are not specifically noted, the minutes do reflect the responses given and the overall discussion.

Dave Bunting and Doug McGarvey, Vice President, were present on behalf of Atlantis Industries Corporation; they stated that Atlantis Industries Corporation is a 50 year old, high quality, full service custom injection molder and tool maker located in Milton, Delaware. They are ITAR (International Traffic in Arms Regulations) registered and ISO 9001 and ISO/TS 16949 certified which is related to automotive.

Atlantis Industries Corporation are experts in taking a concept or idea and turning it into a production proven injection molded part; they are capable of manufacturing very particular engineering grade plastic materials that could be something a customer has engineered or run material out of basic polypropylene ABS, your typical everyday plastics; they expertise in supporting new product development as well as value added services for customers located throughout the United States; approximately 20% of their customers are located in Delaware; they are owned by a private investment group and by the senior management of the Murray Corporation, which acquired Atlantis in August of 2008 and is located in Hunt Valley, Maryland; several of the markets served by Atlantis (military, industrial) are areas that Murray also serves and the belief is that there will be synergies between the two companies.

The Atlantis facility has on-site fully equipped metrology lab; full service tool shop (to run molds/make plastic, build and test other molds & prototypes); sophisticated automation (servo driven robots on many of their machines as well as standalone automated equipment); portable class 100,000 clean room; and a production environment that is climate controlled for air condition and humidity.

Atlantis Industries Corporation serves a number of industries, which allows them to not concentrate on one particular industry and take a financial hit when that industry is not doing well economically. The industries that they serve are Consumer/Industrial, Automotive, Military, Healthcare/Medical and not anyone customer is more than 25% of their business with several of their top 50 customers located in Delaware.

In the plans for Atlantis Industries Corporations future, they are looking at tremendous sales growth of 100% by 2014 and another 100% by 2020; increase workforce by 20 full-time employees by 2016 (10 skilled/professional and 10 unskilled/semi-skilled) with their lowest paying part-time job starting at \$10.00 per hour; Capital Investments of over \$2.34 million by 2016 (\$2.1 million in equipment/machinery and \$245 thousand in existing building renovations to

expand professional office space to support growth as well as converting their existing warehouse space to production and assembly).

Atlantis offers health insurance to their employees (70% Atlantis contribution and 30% employee contribution), sick days (5 per year), vacation, holiday, dental, life insurance and a retirement plan with employee contribution.

Mrs. Webb questioned the terms of the current lease at the Milton facility.

Mr. Bunting shared that the current lease is for five (5) years, expiring in August 2013 then it becomes a year to year lease; they are currently in negotiations with the Landlord to obtain a ten (10) year lease.

Atlantis Industries Corporation is also in negotiations with the Landlord to build a 10,000 sq. ft. or larger warehouse on the property across the street from the current facility. The Landlord has been in contact with the appropriate officials from the Town of Milton (Planning & Zoning and Mayor), pre-zoning and entrance approval for this property has been granted; approval still needs to be obtained from the Town of Milton for the demolition of the home currently on the property. This new warehouse facility is not likely to be built in 2013, as Atlantis Industries Corporation does not have a commitment from the Landlord at this time.

Atlantis Industries Corporation has received grants from the State of Delaware, Delaware Economic Development Office (DEDO) for Funds Disbursement, as well as a Capitol Rebate to help with their Capital Expenditures.

In this application for funds, Atlantis Industries Corporation has applied for a Sussex County Economic Development Grant valuing an employee at a maximum of \$800 per employee for a fulltime job with benefits.

Atlantis plans to use a large portion of the County grant money to renovate the existing two warehouses on the property, which is estimated to cost around \$50,000-\$100,000 for each facility with any remaining grant money used for additional professional offices. The first project would be to renovate the large existing warehouse, converting it into a conditioned assembly area; then the second warehouse located on the property, that currently houses raw materials would be renovated to accommodate the purchase of three (3) additional Machine Presses (one which is twice as large as any they currently own).

Mr. Rider questioned if Atlantis had purchased any of the items on the 2013 Equipment List.

In response to Mr. Rider, Mr. Bunting stated that Atlantis Industries Corporation has purchased the following two pieces of equipment from the Equipment List provided in the grant application (VM2 & EDM); they have visited with a few different Machine Press manufactures in the last month and plan to have at least one Machine Press on-site by May 2013. The 800 ton large Machine Press has to be on-site no later than the end of 2013 as they have a signed contract with this commitment.

There was a brief discussion among the Committee Members.

Mr. Lawson recommended a funding level at \$800 per job from the Economic Development Grant Program to Atlantis Industries Corporation based on their projected and current employment levels of 36 current and 20 future employees which was provided in the application that was submitted to the Committee.

A Motion was made by Mr. Lawson, seconded by Mr. Moore, to fund Atlantis Industries Corporation from the Economic Development Grant Fund for \$800 per job pending Council approval.

Mrs. Webb introduced Mr. Brad Walters, Vice President of Operations for ILC Dover/Grayling Industries.

Grayling Industries manufactures' Industrial Bulk Containers that are used to transport in process powders, materials and liquids between operations at a manufacturing plant, this provides the bulk carrier (bag) which allows the manufacturing operation to transport the materials between their operations. Grayling Industries builds approximately 2 (two) million items a year compared to ILC Dover's Flexible Containment Operation of approximately 50,000 a year.

Grayling Industries initially started their company in the Asbestos Removal business working with other companies to manufacture chemicals, supplies and containers in order to remove asbestos efficiently and safely. The asbestos removal side of the business is expected to be flat with the bulk container business expected to grow. ILC of Dover/Grayling Industries is planning to grow the asbestos removal industry to a universal level as their pharmaceutical business is 60% European and Graylings Industries has no European business at this time.

Mr. Walters stated that ILC Dover/Graylings Industries will be spending approximately 5 (five) million dollars to move the current manufacturing facility in Juarez, Mexico to the new ILC facility in Seaford, Delaware. The new facility in Seaford will consist of 40,000 sq. ft. of production space and 50,000 sq. ft. of warehouse space.

When ILC Dover/Grayling Industries made the agreement to transfer the manufacturing facility from Mexico to United States, the transition to Delaware had to be completed within a year and a half. Grayling Industries' existing sales staff, consisting of 10-12 employees are based in Atlanta, Georgia and will continue to work from that location with the entire manufacturing operation based out of Seaford, Delaware with this transition to be complete sometime in early 2014.

ILC of Dover will be moving nine cells' (production lines) back to Delaware with approximately 11-12 employees working on each cell. The moving process for the equipment will be in 2 (two) stages:

- (1) Shipment of the equipment from Mexico to Delaware and reassembling it in a timely manner to be able to keep their current customers satisfied.
 - (2) Working to make each cell run as efficiently as possible.

Mr. Walters shared the Project Roles and Responsibilities, Implementation Timeline and Production Line Move Sequence from ILC of Dover/Grayling Industries to make the transition from Mexico to Delaware as seamless as possible.

The equipment to be relocated to Delaware will be the 9 (nine) production lines as well as sub-assembly equipment totaling approximately 85 machines; 6 (six) machines are 20-35 feet long and must be taken apart in sections and reassembled after it is delivered to Seaford; 7 machines are 13 feet in diameter; additional

support items to be moved include; forklifts, pallet jacks, pallet racks, tables, carts, test equipment and furniture.

ILC of Dover/Grayling Industries plan to have the Seaford facility modifications completed, Certificate of Occupancy and start hiring first and second shift operators for Cell #1 by the end of May 2013. Set-up, validation and initiate production of Cell #1 should be complete by mid-June 2013. Administrative staff has currently been hired and they will begin to hire hourly employees starting in April and May.

Mr. Walters stated that by the end of the first quarter of 2014 they plan to employ approximately 115 employees and considers the growth of 10-15 employees a year a conservative number with the facility having 170-200 employees within 4-5 years. The Human Resource Department for ILC of Dover/Grayling Industries are planning job fairs and have been in discussions with Town of Seaford, Delaware Technical and Community College as well as Sussex Technical High School about assisting with the training needed to get the facility up and running by the stated benchmark.

ILC of Dover/Grayling Industries will offer medical and dental (ILC pays 75% of the medical/dental expenses) with employees picking up the remaining 25%, 401K program with company match (which is dictated by the state of the economy), life insurance, short term and long term disability, at this time there is no pension plan offered.

DEDO has approved a 3% rebate on the Capitol expenses incurred now and in the future up to \$6.6 million and they also approved a tax return based on the number of employees that are hired by reducing the state tax rate (approximately \$600,000 over a period of 5 (five) years).

Mr. Waters shared that currently the plan for the two plants (Texas and Georgia) that were purchased in the acquisition, are that the Atlanta, Georgia warehouse will close sometime this year and the El Paso, Texas warehouse which employees three employees has a lease that runs through 2015.

ILC Dover to open new plant in Sussex County

Relocation of newly acquired subsidiary's manufacturing operations will bring more than 100 new jobs to Delaware

DOVER, Del. (Jan. 17, 2013) – Engineering development and manufacturing firm <u>ILC</u> <u>Dover</u> will bring 115 new jobs to Delaware after moving the manufacturing operations of its recently acquired subsidiary, Grayling Industries, to a new plant in Sussex County later this year.

Gov. Jack Markell, who announced the new jobs in Thursday's State of the State Address, said ILC Dover's decision to move Grayling's manufacturing operations to Delaware is indicative of the state's friendliness toward small businesses, especially those on the cutting edge of new technology and innovation.

The newly constructed plant near Seaford will allow <u>Grayling</u> to move its current production facility in Juarez, Mexico, to the United States. That production line includes Guardian™ protective packaging for food, chemical, and pharmaceutical dry powder and liquid applications. Grayling also manufactures the leading brands for the asbestos abatement and remediation industry worldwide, including Avail™ glove bags, D-Con™ decontamination enclosures, and Control™ chemicals.

"This brings jobs back to the United States, and there's no place we'd rather have those jobs than Delaware," Markell said. "We want Delaware to be the place where this new synergy between ILC and Grayling takes shape and blossoms. As Delaware's economy continues its steady path to a full recovery, it is companies like ILC Dover that will provide a strong core that we can rely on."

William Wallach, CEO of ILC Dover, worked together with Gov. Markell and <u>Delaware Economic Development Office</u> Director Alan Levin to make this transition as easy as possible.

"We continue to find the State of Delaware very cooperative in their efforts to help the industry grow and prosper. We are excited to have the opportunity to bring jobs back to the United States and the State of Delaware," Wallach said. "ILC Dover and Grayling Industries will continue to grow as we help our customers and bring innovative products to the market."

Frederica-based ILC Dover, known for making spacesuits for NASA, the airbag system for the Mars Rover and Personal Protection Equipment for military, homeland security and industrial users, purchased Grayling earlier this year to complement its flexible containment products for the pharmaceutical industry.

While Grayling's manufacturing operations are moving to Delaware, the subsidiary's offices will remain in Alpharetta, Ga.

As part of the agreement to move Grayling's manufacturing operations to Delaware, ILC Dover has requested a <u>Strategic Fund</u> Performance Grant in the amount of \$364,500 for the creation of 115 new full-time positions in the state. The company also requested a Strategic Fund Capital Expenditures Grant in the amount of \$187,860, or a 3 percent match on qualified capital expenditures up to and including \$6,262,000. The funding is contingent on approval by the Council on Development Finance.

ILC Dover plans to move the first line of products to Delaware in April, when it will hire 35-40 new positions, and complete the move of the other production lines by the end of 2013, when it plans to fill all 115 positions. The company will employ roughly 560 people once the new positions are filled.

Levin lauded the company for choosing Sussex County as the new site for Grayling's production facility.

"They could have gone anywhere to do this, and it shows a real commitment on their part that they are bringing their recently acquired business, and the accompanying jobs, to Delaware," Levin said. "We were eager to work with them to make this happen. We wanted to secure these jobs for Delaware."

Sussex County Council President Michael H. Vincent said ILC Dover's decision to bring good-paying manufacturing jobs to the area will provide a "shot in the arm" for Seaford and western Sussex County.

"As many of us know, the loss of good manufacturing jobs, particularly in the Seaford area, coupled with the economic downturn in recent years, have hit some communities harder than others," Vincent said. "This announcement helps lay the groundwork for a more diversified and robust economy in the years to come."





Dear Mr. Vincent:

Sussex Cyclists, a nonprofit 501C3 cycling organization in Sussex County, will sponsor its ninth year of promoting cycling safety during June and July 2013. We would like Sussex County Council's continued support of this very important safety program that has reduced serious and fatal bicycle accidents.

Our Bike Safety Program is a cooperative effort with DelDOT, State Police Troop 7 and other organizations interested in bicycle safety. Due to our efforts to provide cyclists with safety equipment, brochures explaining the rules of the road and bike safety adjustments, we have had a significant effect on reducing accidents. Furthermore, our on-road presence with signs and tents along Route One in Rehoboth and Dewey, Route 26 in Bethany, and on Rehoboth Avenue; created awareness among motorists that cyclists use the roads too. Many honk and give us the thumbs up sign.

In the past several years our summer check points have been responsible for distributing over 400 helmets. We installed nearly 1,300 light sets which are instrumental in preventing accidents at night. We also adjusted brakes, seats, handle bars and provided other minor repairs to increase the safety of the riders. Each year we see an increase in the number of local riders that we were able to help with equipment and adjustments. Through DelDOT we acquired bikes which we repaired and installed lights on and then donated to visitor workers and especially to year round residents, many through their employer, to enable them to get back and forth to work.

Our program for 2013 is much the same as last year. Bicycle safety check points will be set up along Route One, Rehoboth Avenue and in Bethany. New this year are plans to add stops in the Fenwick area, as well as find ways to expand to Eastern Sussex County. Our partners will also attend church-sponsored dinners to interact with the cyclists and distribute bicycles and safety equipment.

Of course, all of this requires financial support. We hope that Sussex County Council recognizes the value of this program and will again help us provide visitors, local citizens and the cycling public with the tools that will help provide a margin of safety as they cycle on our roads. A contribution of \$2000 by Sussex County Council will represent a significant boost to help us achieve our goals to provide important information and essential equipment such as helmets and light sets to cyclists and to promote safety awareness for cyclists and motorists alike:

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE COMPREHENSIVE ZONING MAP OF SUSSEX COUNTY FROM AN AR-1 AGRICULTURAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT AND A C-1 GENERAL COMMERCIAL DISTRICT TO A CR-1 COMMERCIAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT FOR CERTAIN PARCELS OF LAND LYING AND BEING IN LITTLE CREEK HUNDRED, SUSSEX COUNTY, CONTAINING 9.4596 ACRES, MORE OR LESS (Tax Map I.D. 332-1.00-100.00 & 101.00)

WHEREAS, on the 18th day of April 2013, a zoning application, denominated Change of Zone No. 1730 was filed on behalf of Two Farms, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, on the _____ day of _____ 2013, a public hearing was held, after notice, before the Planning and Zoning Commission of Sussex County and said Planning and Zoning Commission recommended that Change of Zone No. 1730 be _____; and

WHEREAS, on the ____ day of _____ 2013, a public hearing was held, after notice, before the County Council of Sussex County and the County Council of Sussex County has determined, based on the findings of facts, that said change of zone is in accordance with the Comprehensive Development Plan and promotes the health, safety, morals, convenience, order, prosperity and welfare of the present and future inhabitants of Sussex County,

NOW, THEREFORE,

THE COUNTY OF SUSSEX HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Chapter 115, Article II, Subsection 115-7, Code of Sussex County, be amended by deleting from the Comprehensive Zoning Map of Sussex County the zoning classification of [AR-1 Agricultural Residential District and C-1 General Commercial District] and adding in lieu thereof the designation CR-1 Commercial Residential District as it applies to the property hereinafter described.

Section 2. The subject property is described as follows:

ALL that certain tract, piece or parcel of land lying and being situate in Little Creek Hundred, Sussex County, Delaware, and lying at the southeast corner of U.S. Route 13 and Route 24 and being more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the southerly right-of-way of Route 24, a corner for these subject lands and lands of Carol M. O'Neal; thence by and along said O'Neal lands

south 14°40'09" west 309.26 feet to a point, and south 77°26'09" east 219.82 feet to a point; thence south 17°47'30" west 755.12 feet along lands of James C. and Janet Windsor, Trustees, to a point in center of a ditch; thence southwesterly 301.57 feet along the meandering centerline of the ditch to a point on the easterly right-of-way of U.S. Route 13; thence north 00°58'07" east 1,143.27 feet along the easterly right-of-way of U.S. Route 13 to a point; thence north 48°56'50" east 37.50 feet along the corner-cut for the intersection of U.S. Route 13 and Route 24 to a point; thence south 79°43'26" east 326.42 feet along the southerly right-of-way of Route 24 to the point and place of beginning, and containing 9.4596 acres, more or less.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by majority vote of all members of the County Council of Sussex County, Delaware.
